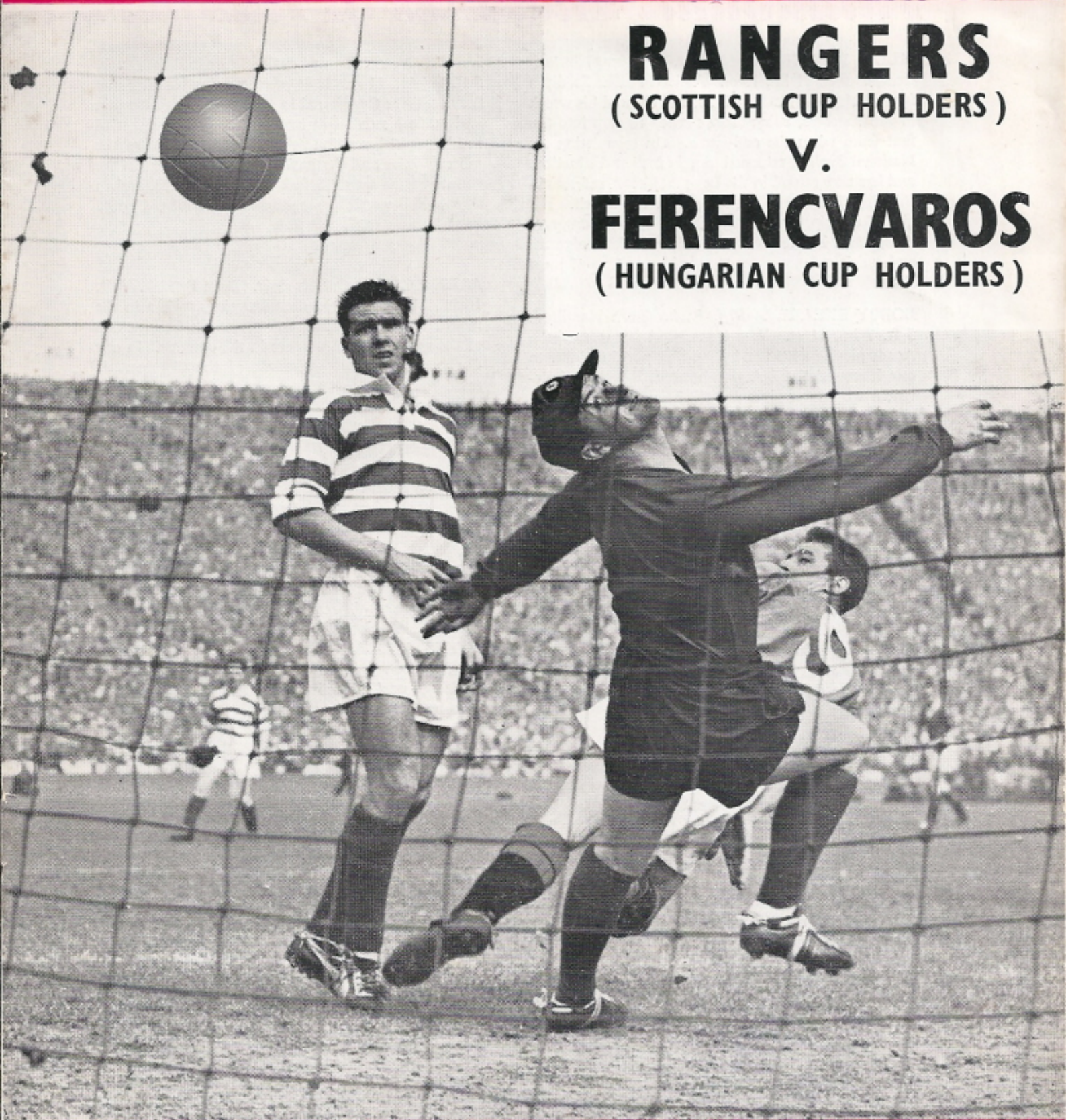

Thumbnail Sketches of Rangers

BILLY RITCHIE—*Goalkeeper*. Born Newton-grange. 5 ft. 11 in., 13 st. Arrived at The Stadium from Bathgate Thistle in 1954, and showed his worth in the Reserves, being always ready to step into the first team when the call came. On completing his National Service, returned to gain further distinction, and has now settled in the League side. A safe, slick-thinking 'keeper, cool and sure in the clutch. His gift of anticipation makes his job appear comparatively easy, but that is merely because his judgment and quick reflexes seem to put him in line of most shots.

BOBBY SHEARER—*Right-back*. Born Hamilton. 5 ft. 7 in., 11 st. Was transferred from Hamilton Academicals in 1955 and played his part in adding to our honours' list. A lion-hearted, determined defender who never gives up. As he says: "The day I was invited to sign for Rangers was the happiest in my life, and I have never had cause to change that view." He is one of the greatest clubmen we have had, and after a spell in the Reserve team, is now back better than ever in the first team.

ERIC CALDOW—*Left-back*. Born Cumnock. 5 ft. 8 in., 10 st. 5 lb. Was signed from Muirkirk Juniors in July, 1952. The Ayrshire lad was groomed in the Reserve team and when the chance came to step up, accepted it with conspicuous success. A restless, eager defender who uses the ball with foresight once he has cleared his perimeter of danger. Heavily laden in International honours—with more to come. Plays against the League of Ireland, at Parkhead, next Wednesday.

HAROLD DAVIS—*Right-half*. Born Cupar. 6 ft., 12 st. 6 lb. Transferred from East Fife in November, 1956, and quickly proved the wisdom of the move. A safe, effective tackler who likes the going heavy. Has a vicious shot, and has netted more than one important goal by being up with the forwards once he has initiated a thrust. Is having his best season.

BILL PATERSON—*Centre-half*. Born Kinlochleven. 6 ft. 1 in., 13 st. Arrived at Ibrox from Newcastle United in 1958, and though he had to wait until last season to find a permanent berth in the first team, was ever at hand, safe and sure. Gave one of his brightest performances against Celtic in our 5-1 League Championship win at Parkhead this season. Takes no chances in clearing his lines.

WILLIAM STEVENSON—*Left-half*. Born Leith. 5 ft. 9 in., 10 st. 10 lb. Became a Ranger in November, 1956, and demonstrated how his promise as a schoolboy was to come to fulfilment as a Senior. A quick and telling challenger who uses the ball shrewdly and with precision. His short and long passes almost invariably start the attack on the move.

JAMES BAXTER—*Left-half*. Born Hill O' Beath. 5 ft. 10½ in., 11 st. Is at present doing his National Service. Was transferred in June from Raith Rovers, and made his debut at inside-left. Has now settled in his original position at left-half. Was one of the most effective and rhythmic moving half-backs in the country when we were first attracted to him, and in showing his worth to the full in our colours. Can go in and grab a goal.

ALEX. SCOTT—*Outside-right*. Born Falkirk. 5 ft. 10 in., 11 st. A slick, accurate winger when in the mood. Has terrific acceleration, and can become one of the most effective wingers in the country. In our European Cup matches, most of the Continentals rated him our most menacing forward. Is also a clever dribbler and discloses commendable judgment when sending the ball over.

IAN McMILLAN—*Inside-right*. Born Airdrie. 5 ft. 7 in., 10 st. 12 lb. Was transferred from Airdrie in October, 1958, and helped considerably in the winning of the League Championship that season. A suave, penetrating inside-forward with a graceful, silky touch and intelligent service.

JAMES MILLAR—*Centre-forward*. Born Edinburgh. 5 ft. 6 in., 10 st. 10 lb. Joined us from Dunfermline Athletic in 1955. A versatile performer who has operated in the half-back line and inside-right positions, but has now taken over the leadership. Is a natural footballer, possessed of splendid ball control and stamina. A restless and productive attacker.

RALPH BRAND—*Inside-left*. Born Edinburgh. 5 ft. 7 in., 10 st. It was in 1952 that Ralph became a Ranger from Carricknowe School. A natural footballer, he has appeared in several positions with conspicuous success, particularly at outside-right. His ball control and feinting can bring a fatal uncertainty to any opposition, while he has netted many spectacular and match-winning goals.

DAVID WILSON—*Outside-left*. Born Glasgow. 5 ft. 6 in., 10 st. 8 lb. It was in May, 1956, when this clever, plucky young fellow arrived at The Stadium as one of the most promising youngsters in the game. Such is his talent that he has won the outside-left berth as his own. Has also been played at inside-left. Has been chosen to play against the League of Ireland, at Parkhead next Wednesday.

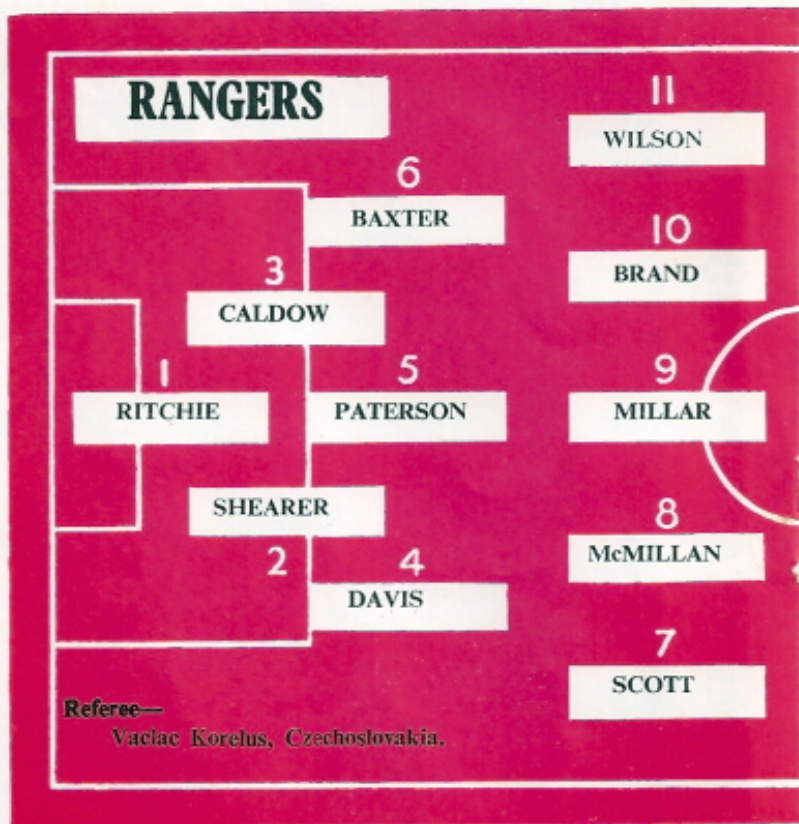

HOW THE TEAMS WILL LINEUP IN TONIGHT

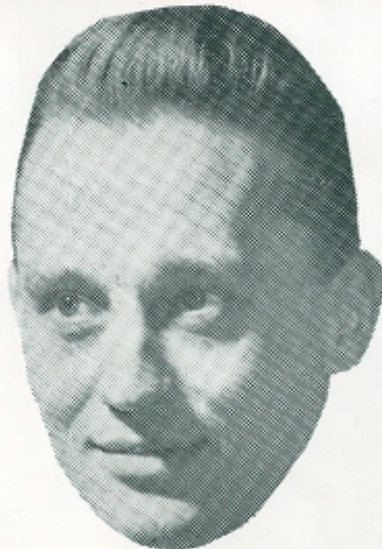


Dr. M. FENYVESI.

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Our Chairman's Comments

WE are indeed delighted to welcome Ferencvaros, the Hungarian Cup-holders, to The Stadium this evening in this preliminary round of the new European Cup for national Cup winners. They are here as the first Hungarian side to play against us in Glasgow, and a side of such acknowledged talent are therefore doubly welcome.

Ferencvaros rightly claim to being one of the most artistic and resourceful teams in Europe. They have been their country's champions on 17 occasions, and given many distinguished players to International football.

Their centre-forward, for instance, is Florain Albert, a brilliant ball-player, fast and skilful in exploiting to the full a chance a less shrewd and quick-thinking leader would let slip. Another exquisite manipulator and a fleet-footed raider is Mate Fenyvesi.

PLAYED AT BUDAPEST

Their regular backs, the injured Alex Matrai, and Eugen Dalnoki, played against Scotland in Budapest last June when the match was drawn 3-3. They are of course absent from this evenings game. Our own player, Eric Caldow, was engaged in that match which was watched by 100,000 crowd, eager to see their boys triumph, but who cheered our own lads from the field at the finish.

Those regaled by the splendour of that contest had nothing but praise for the ability of both teams, and have not been slow in telling us of the treat we can expect from the Ferencvaros players who wore their country's colours.

Hungary, of course, has long been accepted as producing some of the world's finest players such as the famous Puskas and from what I am told, they believe they have players of comparable genius coming through to take their place in the van of International as well as club football.

CLEVER RECRUITS

Ferencvaros have shown eagerness and intelligence in developing their young recruits and grooming them in the highest arts of the game. That is why they are here this evening as representing the best in their country. I'm told they produced exciting and beautifully controlled play in cutting their way through to win their national Cup, and I need hardly say how we expect to see further evidence this evening of their sound technique.

They tell us how the name Rangers Football Club is so well known in their country as, like themselves, supplying so many players to International football. We pride ourselves in having given more players to Scotland teams than any other club, and do so knowing how arduous, yet rewarding, is the task of maintaining such a standard. The challenge is ever manifest, a healthy challenge and certainly one from which none at Ibrox would side-step.

It is our fervent hope that we prove ourselves capable of going forward to the next stage of this

tournament. As Scottish Cup holders we are not in any way blind to the importance of tonight's result and the bearing it can have in the second of those home-and-home fixtures in Hungary.

PLAYED IN MANY CENTRES

We can take much heart from the knowledge that we reached last year's European Cup semi-final, as Scottish League champions, beating Anderlecht, champions of Belgium, Red Star (Bratislava), winners of the Czechoslovakian League Championship, and Sparta, of Holland, before going down to Eintracht, of Germany.

We have, of course, had many gripping encounters with Continental teams, apart from our European Cup sorties. We have played in such countries as Austria, Spain, Portugal, Denmark, Germany, France, Czechoslovakia, Italy and Belgium, while our three tours of Canada and America—in 1928, 1930 and again in 1954—provided lasting memories of joyous days and lasting friendships.

It is my fond hope, therefore, that our meeting with our Hungarian visitors this evening will add to the goodwill generated in our contests. We aim to win—that is a natural and burning ambition—but there can be something given to both countries outwith the result—a respect and appreciation heightened by the brotherhood of sport. That is a precious thing, and worth striving to obtain. It can be so in this instance.

We have played 32 matches, won 28, drawn 3 and lost 1 in Canada.

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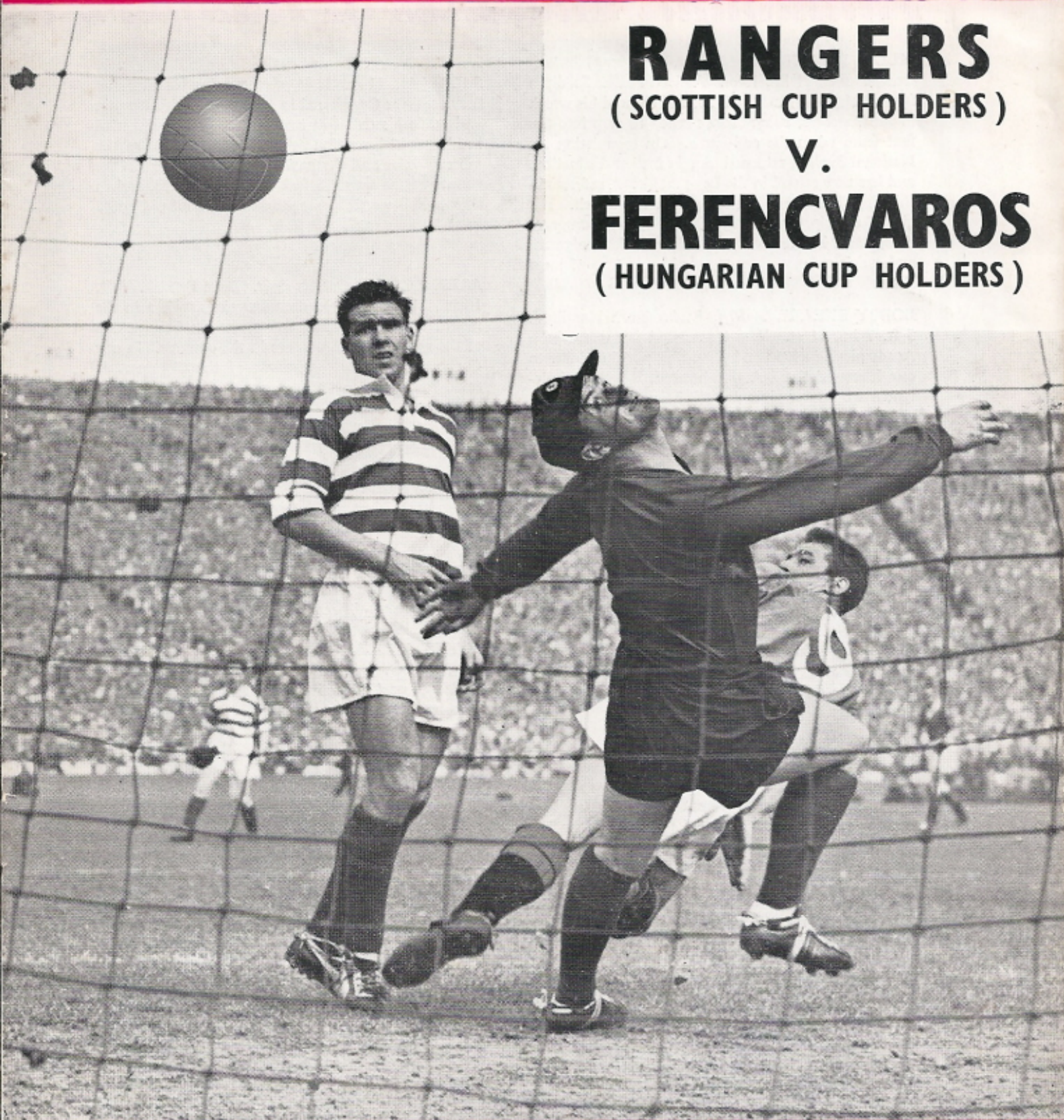
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
